The Asian American Federation of New York's mission is to advance the civic voice and well-being of Asian Americans. We collaboratively foster philanthropy in the community, undertake research to inform policies, and provide support to community service organizations.

Asian American Philanthropy & Community Fund

- Briefings, forums, and participation on committees and task forces to share research findings and census information, help implement research-based policy recommendations, and foster dialogue on issues.

An often overlooked and underrepresented population, immigrant Filipinas in the US outnumber their male counterparts by 2 to 1. BABAE fills a gaping and growing need to provide direct services to this community of women.

The Census Information Center (CIC) Program is a community-based component of the U.S. Census Bureau's Data Dissemination Network. Its purpose is to facilitate access and use of census data as well as participation in Census Bureau censuses and surveys by underserved communities.

In August 2000, the Census Bureau designated the Asian American Federation as one of the 58 CICs in the country. As an official repository of Census Bureau data, the Federation receives a variety of data products, information and services directly from the Census Bureau.

INTRODUCTION

Using data from the U.S. Census Bureau, this brief outlines some of the characteristics and trends in New York Citv's growing Asian American population. It features statistics on the Asian American population, ethnic composition, citizenship status, educational attainment, language abilities, income, housing, and poverty and compares some key variables with New York City's total population. The two sources of data from the Census Bureau are the annual population estimates and the 2005 American Community Survey (ACS). The annual population estimates provided population estimates for Asian Americans by age group. The 2005 ACS provided socio-economic data and ethnic group household population estimates. The 2005 ACS only included the household population of the United States; group quarters, such as correctional facilities, nursing homes, mental hospitals, college dormitories, military barracks, group homes, missions, and shelters, were not included in the survey. The Census Bureau plans to include group guarters starting with the 2006 ACS.

POPULATION

Approximately 73 percent of the Asian American population in New York State lives in New York City. The Asian population in New York City grew by 11 percent from and estimated 902,032 on July 1, 2000 to 1,004,661 on July 1, 2005. The annualized population growth rate of 2.2 percent was the fastest among all major race and ethnic groups in New York City. Twelve percent of New York City's population is Asian. According to the 2005 ACS, the largest Asian American groups in New York City were Chinese¹ (46 percent of Asian population), Asian Indian (25 percent), Korean (10 percent), and Filipino (7 percent), followed by Pakistani, Japanese, Bangladeshi, and Vietnamese with 2 percent each. (See Table 1 for a more detailed breakdown.)

Census Bureau population estimates by age group show that growth is uneven in the Asian American population and greatly differs from trends in the general population. Asian American seniors (individuals over the age of 65) were the fastest growing age group population. Seniors increased by 31 percent from 65,391 in 2000 to 85,762 in 2005. In the general population, the senior population grew by 5 percent. Children (under the age of 20) grew by 8 percent from 228,263 in 2000 to 245,592 in 2005, contrasted with a decline of 1 percent for the same age group in the general population. The working Asian American population (aged 20 to 64) increased by 11 percent from 608,378 in 2000 to 673,307 in 2005 and is higher than the 2 percent growth rate for the general population.

CITIZENSHIP

Immigrants comprised a major proportion of the Asian American household population in New York City in the 2005 ACS. Seventy-three percent of the Asian household population was foreign-born while only 37 percent of New York City's household population was foreign-born. Fifty-four percent of the Asian foreign-born population in households were naturalized citizens, compared to 50 percent of all foreign-born New Yorkers in households.

Individuals born in Asia have a higher rate of becoming naturalized citizens than their New York City counterparts. For those immigrants arriving between 1990 and 1999, 46 percent of those born in Asia became citizens, compared to 39 percent for the foreign-born household population in New York City. Seventy-five percent of Asian-born individuals arriving between 1980 and 1989 became naturalized citizens and 87 percent arriving before 1980

became citizens. This is significantly higher than the naturalization rates for all foreign-born individuals in New York City households at 64 percent of those who came between 1980 and 1989 and 82 percent of those who came before 1980 who became naturalized citizens.

EDUCATION

According to the 2005 ACS, Asian Americans occupy two very different ends of the education spectrum. For Asian adults² living in households, 22 percent do not have a high school diploma, close to the 21 percent rate for all adults living in households. Thirteen percent of Asian adults in households have less than a 9th grade education, higher than the overall New York City rate where 10 percent have less than a 9th grade education. On the other end of the educational ladder, 56 percent of Asian adults in households had some form of post-secondary education, compare with 52 percent of the general household population.

LANGUAGE ABILITIES

Limited English proficiency is a major issue in New York City's Asian population. Using the Department of Justice definition of English proficiency, 46 percent of Asians living in households have limited English proficiency, compared to 23 percent of the entire New York City household population. Among those who spoke either English "Not Well" or "Not at All", 21 percent spoke an Asian or Pacific Island language at home, another 21 percent spoke an Indo-European language (which includes many South Asian languages), 56 percent spoke Spanish and the remaining 2 percent spoke other languages.

POVERTY

Asian poverty³ rates are similar to the total population poverty rates except for elderly poverty rates. According to the 2005 ACS, 18 percent of Asians in households live below the poverty line compared to an overall New York City rate of 19 percent. Twenty-three percent of Asian children in New York City live in poverty which is lower than the total New York City child poverty rate of 28 percent. While the New York City elderly poverty rate is 20 percent, the Asian poverty rate is significantly higher at 25 percent.

From the perspective of households, Asian households as a whole have a poverty rate of 16 percent, close to the 17 percent for New York City households in general. However, the general poverty rate masks significant differences in the types of households in poverty in the two populations. For married-couple families, families with an Asian householder had a poverty rate of

15 percent compared to 9 percent for those families in general. In single parent households with children less than 18 years of age, 25 percent of households led by an Asian male and 36 percent of households led by an Asian female lived in poverty, rates not significantly different from the general population. With three quarters of Asian households consisting of married-couple families compared with 58 percent of households in general, poverty programs aimed at Asian Americans should consider married-couple families, in addition to single parent families.

INCOME

Compared to their New York City counterparts, Asians have higher median household and family incomes⁴, but lower per capita incomes. Asians have a higher median household income (\$48,229) than the City median household income of \$43,434. Asian median family incomes (\$50,839) are not significantly higher than the New York City median family income of \$49,374. However, Asian per capita incomes (\$24,034) are far below the New York City per capita income of \$27,233. Median earnings among Asian workers age 16 and older was \$28,356, compared to \$31,234 for workers in general.

Housing

Corresponding with the overall New York City patterns, most Asian households are renters with 60 percent renting and can be compared to the City rates of 67 percent of all households being renters. The proportion of households that rent has fallen since the Census 2000, where 66 percent of Asian households and 70 percent of all New York households rented.

Conclusion

New York City's Asian American population has seen a tremendous amount of change in size from 2000 to 2005. According to the U.S. Census, Asian Americans have higher rates of post secondary education and higher household and family incomes, but also include more individuals without high school diplomas and face higher rates of senior poverty and more language needs than the general New York City population. Far from being the model minority, Asians in New York City face a number of major social challenges.

NOTES ABOUT THE DATA

The 2005 American Community Survey allowed respondents to mark more than one race. There are results for single race responses, as well as for multiple race responses. "Asian Alone" corresponds to the respondents who reported exactly one Asian group and no other Asian group or race category. "Alone" should be considered the minimum population size in any analysis that uses Census data. "Alone or in any Combination" corresponds to the responses (not respondents) that include the selected Asian group, either alone or in any combination with other Asian groups or other race categories. If a respondent selected more than one Asian group (i.e. "Korean" and "Chinese"), that individual would be tallied in the total for each Asian group; hence, some overlap in the In Combination numbers will occur. "Alone or in any Combination" should be considered the maximum population size in any analysis that uses Census data. The Census Bureau also provides annual population estimates for both Asian Alone and Asian Alone and in Combination.

- ¹ Chinese population numbers did not include the Taiwanese population.
- ² For education tabulations, adults were defined as individuals who are over the age of 25 years old.
- ³ Families and persons are classified as below poverty if their total family income or unrelated individual income was less than the poverty threshold specified for the applicable family size, age of householder, and number of related children under 18 present in 12 months prior to the month of survey being taken. For these thresholds, please see the Subject Definitions Guide for the 2005 ACS.
- 4 A family income refers to the earnings of a group of two people or more (one of whom is the householder) related by birth, marriage, or adoption and residing together while a household income refers to the income of all the people who occupy a housing unit.

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
